
WELCOME!

Each year, Renbrook seventh graders begin a journey that will culminate in April of their eighth-grade year when they decide where they will attend secondary school. Starting in January, seventh graders attend Secondary School Seminar classes which help them identify their strengths, set goals for their eighth-grade year, explore the school search process, and get to know the Secondary School Placement Director. In addition, parents attend an information session in April followed by a personal consultation with the Secondary School Placement Director to discuss which schools are the best match for their child.

In eighth grade, students resume Secondary School Seminar classes where they practice interview skills, plan and write their school essays, discuss school visits, and refine their school list. In addition, the Secondary School Placement Director maintains close relationships with admission officers from many secondary schools, and Renbrook hosts both a school fair and lunch visits from school representatives to help families with their decisions.

Renbrook eighth graders attend independent secondary schools, parochial secondary schools, or local public high schools. Because of our excellent academic program and the past success of our students, Renbrook students are prized by independent schools in Connecticut and beyond. Renbrook students are known for their superb preparation, self-advocacy, poise, and confidence. Renbrook faculty know each student as an individual and understand their potential, allowing us to foster the best match for every student with their next school. The secondary school process is a voyage of discovery for students and their families, and the placement office is here to guide you through this journey.



School Fit

Families should consider a variety of factors when choosing schools to explore. Distance from home, school size, unique offerings, or a family's personal connections may influence the student's list, but placement professionals recommend considering the following touchstones as well when evaluating school fit.

PEOPLE

Beautiful facilities are wonderful, but strong interpersonal relationships are priceless. How welcoming and open are the students and faculty that you meet?

FEEL

Would you rather spend time in a village or a bustling city? The size of your school affects the kind of community you will live in for the next four years. Do you want a school where you will eventually know everybody, or a place where a new face is always around the corner?

INSTRUCTION

How does the school teach and evaluate students? Some schools expect incoming students to have all their study skills solidly in place. Other schools teach test-taking and note-taking skills explicitly. What does this school do?

SELECTIVITY

If you plan to apply to schools that accept 10% or less of their applicants, you need to include some schools that that you have options on March 10.

What Schools Look For

All schools want students who:


- love to learn

ADVISING

The independent school advantage is that your child will be known. How does the school get to know your child? How many adults will be part of that deep knowledge?

PROGRAM


Schools, especially big schools, have tremendous offerings. As you peruse a school's extensive course catalog, make sure you understand when and how students take advantage of the most exciting opportunities.



Developing the School List

The placement office sends out a questionnaire to seventh-grade parents before the parent evening in April and uses those to help formulate suggestions for a school list. Sometimes the list is focused on proximity to home if the applicant will be a day student. If the student is open to boarding, the placement office can make additional recommendations. The list is discussed at the initial parent consultation, and then students and parents do additional research to see if there are schools that they had not originally considered.

Additional Considerations



School Visits

Summer can be a great time to visit a campus, even though it will feel very different from the official fall visit when students are on campus. During a school visit, you learn much more about the program and facilities, and you really have a chance to see how students behave.

Are the students friendly and helpful? Do they greet you as you walk about campus?

Application & Interview Process

Students meet with the Director of Secondary School Placement individually in the spring of seventh grade and again in the fall of eighth grade. These informal meetings provide students with a safe space to hone their interview skills. In SSS class, we discuss the dos and don'ts of interviews and go over the most common questions that will be asked. Each student will participate in a mock interview with the Placement Director to make sure they are ready and feel confident.

Introduction to the Application

The application form most commonly used is provided by SSAT and called the Standard Application Online (SAO). Almost all schools use this common app, but a few will require a separate platform.

Schools that DO NOT USE SAO are **Andover**, **Choate**, **Deerfield**, **Exeter**, **Groton**, **Hotchkiss**, **and St. Paul's**. They use a portal called Gateway to Prep. In addition, Catholic schools use their own online portals, as do some schools located in other parts of the country or along "the Gold Coast," which includes Fairfield and Westchester counties.

ALL students need to create an SAO account, as this is how we collect transcript and recommendation release forms. If students are applying to Choate or another "Gateway" school, they will need a Gateway account IN ADDITION TO their SAO account.

Since you can use Gateway to Prep to apply to many other local schools, families sometimes ask if they can bypass using SAO altogether. The answer is NO. SAO provides the placement office with a superior interface to track applications, and we far prefer using it to Gateway. At this time, we require that students use SAO for all applications except the seven schools in bold and Catholic schools. If you are applying to a school that does not accept SAO or Gateway, discuss what platform to use with the Placement Director.

Five Parts of the Application

1

Student Profile: Includes biographical information, activities, interests, and achievements is provided by Renbrook School.

2

Transcript: Provided by Renbrook School and generally includes grade six, grade seven, and the fall of grade eight.

3

Student and Parent Essays: These are generally standardized in SAO and school-specific in Gateway and other portals.

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Confidential Renbrook teacher recommendations: These always include a student's CURRENT math and English teacher. If a student is not submitting SSAT scores, a third teacher recommendation from a current teacher is recommended. In addition, we recommend that students ask for a personal recommendation from any teacher or adult who knows them well, and a special interest recommendation from a coach, music teacher, club advisor, or similar.



Additional requirements: Some schools require a GRADED essay from the student's eighth-grade year. Others have supplementary questions they ask in addition to the required, standard essays. Students will be given a spreadsheet template to organize these requirements.

Recommendations

As mentioned above, students need a variety of recommendations so that schools can assess readiness for their programs. At this time, Renbrook bypasses the online request systems in the application platforms and submits its own teacher recommendations separately. Families may use the online request system for recommendations from outside of the Renbrook community.

Students will receive recommendation request "cards" which they need to hand to teachers. We feel that it is important that students approach teachers to ask for a recommendation. Teachers then send those recommendations for proofreading to the Placement Director, who also benefits from knowing what is being said about each candidate. Finally, the Placement Director uploads the recommendations to SAO or sends them to the Gateway to Prep or other schools.

Students are encouraged to ask coaches, music teachers, neighbors, etc., to write recommendations if they feel that these individuals know them well. Recommendations from outside of Renbrook can be sent EITHER to the Placement Office OR directly to schools. The online portals should be used to email those requests to anyone OUTSIDE the Renbrook community.

Testing

Secondary schools often use the Secondary School Admission Test (SSAT) as a way to verify information in a student's file. Since the pandemic, many schools have become test-optional for the SSAT, and many students have decided to bypass this sometimes stressful process. Good test scores can be helpful for students seeking admission to schools, but they are never enough to guarantee admission. For financial aid candidates, higher test scores can sometimes help a school decide to award aid dollars. Renbrook will support students who wish to take the SSAT in a variety of ways.

Financial Aid

Secondary school is expensive and families who need aid should apply. The income levels at which aid is awarded are probably higher than you might expect. On the other hand, financial aid candidates will have a harder time facing admission; only a few schools can afford to consider applications without referring to whether students need financial support. Families often ask if seeking financial aid will hurt their child's chances of gaining admission. The answer is that it adds another screening level. A wonderful candidate who needs aid will be sought after at the right-fit school. Students needing a high amount of financial aid (over 50% of tuition) are encouraged to apply to boarding schools out of the immediate area to increase their chances of a positive outcome. Families whose children have attended Renbrook for many years should also be aware that day schools are traditionally more generous with financial aid than boarding schools.

Families should also be aware that schools take a dim view of awarding financial aid if families do not appear to prioritize education with their spending decisions. In other words, a family that drives expensive cars and takes lavish vacations may qualify on paper for financial aid, but admission officers are much less likely to choose students if the family is clearly not interested in paying what they can afford for education.

Decision Time

Most secondary schools release their admission decisions on March 10. Families then have one month, until April 10, to sign a contract with a school and submit a deposit. A few schools have instituted early decision deadlines, most notably Suffield Academy.

Students receive three possible results of their application:

- Accept: The secondary school is offering a place in the next year's class as long as the student finishes the year in good standing at Renbrook. Parents need to plan to put down a deposit along with the contact when students are accepted. As soon as families know that their student will or will not attend, they should let the school know.
- Waitlist: The secondary school does not have a place in the next year's class for this student at this time. Other students fit the school's needs better, and until a number of students decline their admission offer, the waitlist will not open up. Students can indicate that they wish to remain on a waitlist, but they may not learn whether a place is available until after April 10, when contracts are due.

indeed have been guite successful at their institution.

Waitlist and deny decisions are very difficult for families to process, and explaining that the decision of the school is not personal, is challenging. However, it is important to understand that very often, the decision is not about the student specifically. Schools only have room for a certain number of students in their freshman class, and the number of families seeking day spots in local boarding schools has skyrocketed.

Schools fill openings with what they need; this varies wildly from year to year. One year, the band program may be desperate for horn players. Another year, a school is trying to find students who love public policy and government for a new program they are offering. Demographic quirks sometimes mean that too many girls are applying for too few places. Another year the issue will be boys. Certainly, students may feel upset for not having ideal transcripts and blame that for losing a coveted space at an area school, but if their list of school choices was realistic, they should have an option for the next year.



• **Deny:** Some selective secondary schools receive applications from many more qualified students than they can offer admission to. Because of this, admissions offices are often forced to make difficult decisions and deny students who may

Final Thoughts

To ensure the best possible outcome in the secondary school process, keep the following principles in mind:

Commit to the Process

Make sure you follow the directions for applying to each school. Meet the deadlines and don't give schools a reason to think that you aren't serious about them.

• Do Not Apply to a School You Don't Want to Attend

Students talk about "safety" schools or say that a particular school is at the bottom of their list. Since that might be the students' only option come March 10, they should be positive about all applications.

• Keep an Open Mind

Parents and students need to examine each school from their own perspective. Being able to brag about a school that your child got into will sour quickly if they are unhappy and unsuccessful there. A "good school" is anywhere your child will grow and flourish. That might be a boarding school a few hours away or a single sex school.

• Let it Go

Ultimately, you only have control over a few elements of the application process. Students can work hard and take their applications seriously. Parents can express interest in the school, network, and pull strings, but ultimately, the Secondary School Admission Committee will do what is in the best interest of the school and the class it is building. Recognize that this may be the first time you may not be able to provide what your child wants. Build resilience before you get to decision day by expressing your belief in your child no matter what the outcome is.


